Vampire examines this creature in all its various tations and cultural meanings. Ken Gelder investigates vam narratives in literature and in film - from early vampire stor Polidori's The Vampyre, J. Sheridan Le Fanu's 'lesbian vamp' 'Carmilla' and Bram Stoker's Dracula, the most famous vam tive of all, to contemporary American vampire blockbusters Stephen King and others, the vampire chronicles of Anne Ri Ceausescu' vampire narratives, and films such as F. W. Muri Nooferatu and Francis Ford Coppola's Bram Stoker's 'Dracula'

embeds vampires in their cultural contenting how vampire narratives reproduce the anxieties and fasc their times - from nineteenth-century investments in travel a tourism, issues of colonialism and national identity and observith sex, to the 'queer' identity of the vampire, the association vampire with the 'global exotic' and current concerns about value, the family and national security.
